I Benjamin Chittenden of Wallingford in New Haven County in Connecticut a resident citizen of the United States, do depose & on oath declare that I served my country in the revolutionary war more than one year on the continental establishment that after serving as a private soldier was soon commissioned officer from the commencement of the war I was appointed an Ensign in Capt Charles Donist's Company in the fourth Connecticut regiment then commanded by Col Douglass in Nov 1776 & entered the service as such & soon after received a commission as such & continued in service in the same regiment afterwards for a short time under Col Lamon, & then commanded by Col R. J. Meigs, till an account of my ill health I resigned my Commission and was discharged in April 1778 - that regiment was afterward the 6th & then again the 4th in the Connecticut Line of the Army & that by time and accident my discharge & Commission are both lost except a small part of my Commission which I now produce.

That by reason of my reduced circumstances in life I now need assistance from my Country for support.

I therefore pray that I may be placed on the pension list of the United States as a commissioned officer according to the provision of the act of Congress, entitled "An act to provide for certain persons in the land & naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war."

New Haven April 9th 1818 — Benjamin Chittenden

At a County Court, held in and for the County of New Haven, in the District and State of Connecticut, on the 5th day of July 1820, the same being a Court of Record, and having a Seal, by virtue of the laws of said State.

PERSONALLY APPEARED, in open Court, Benjamin Cottenden a resident in the town of Wallingford in the County of New Haven in said State, and exhibited and subscribed the following Schedule, and made oath that the same is a true and perfect Schedule of all his income and property, necessary cloathing and beding excepted, viz:

Be it Remembered, That in the County Court, held in and for the County of New Haven, in the District and State aforesaid, on this 5th day of July 1827, the same being a Court of Record, and having a Seal, under the authority of said State, personally came and appeared in open Court, Benjamin Witterton aged 66 years, resident in the Town of Wallingford in the County of New Haven in said State, and being sworn according to Law, doth on his Oath declare that he served in the Revolutionary War, as follows: in the command of a regiment commanded by Col. Mills in Capt. Charles Potts company as an ensign in said company. Said regiment was also under the command of Col. Duglass. That during while I was in the service which was about one year and nine months.

that the original Declaration made by him, for the purpose of obtaining a pension under the Act of Congress of the 18th of March 1818, was dated the 16th day of April 1818; that in pursuance thereof he was entered in the list of Pensioners, and received a Pension Certificate No. 250. And I do further solemnly swear that I was a resident citizen of the United States, on the 18th day of March, 1818, and that I have not since that time, by gift, sale, or in any manner, disposed of my property, or any part thereof, with intent thereby so to diminish it, as to bring myself within the provisions of an Act of Congress, entitled "An Act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the Revolutionary War," passed on the 18th day of March, 1818; and that I have not, nor has any person, in trust, for me, any property or securities, contracts or debts due to me; nor have I any income other than what is contained in the Schedule hereunto annexed, and by me subscribed. And I do further declare that my occupation is that of a Farmer, joined with by reason of age and infirmity I am unable to labour at any kind of employment.

and that I have a family residing with me as follows my wife Rebekah aged 50 years unable to support herself my Daughter Madaline Mrs. Davis aged 16 years able to support herself my Grand son Joseph Davis Mrs. Davis aged 11 years unable to support himself.

all which is subscribed by me the day and year aforesaid.
