Our motion of George Bruce ordered that the following
declaration and schedule be admitted to record to wit
Original claim

District of Kentucky Hardwar Circuit Oct on this 19th
day of September 1820 personally appeared in open
Court being a Court of record George Bruce aged thirty
years who being first duly sworn according to law
doth on his oath make the following declaration
in order to obtain the provision made by the act of
Congress of the 18th of March 1818 and the 1st of May
1820 that he the said Bruce enlisted for the term of
three years or during the war in September 1776 in the
State of Virginia in the company commanded by Captain
Robert Cole in the regiment commanded by Colonel
Lesawper & first thats libert in the line of the State of
Virginia on the continental establishment that he
continued to serve in the same corps until the 1st of
1779 when he was discharged from the service in
the State of Pennsylvania and that he was in the battle
of Brandywine and that he has no other evidence in
his power of his service. And in pursuance of an
act of the 1st of May 1820. I do solemnly swear that I
was a resident citizen of the United States on the 18th
day of March 1818 and that I have not since that
time by gift sale or in any manner disposed of my
property for any part thereof with intent thereby to
defraud as to the being subject within the provisions
of an act of Congress entitled an act to provide for certain
persons engaged in the land and naval service of
the United States with the revolutionary war passed on
the 18th day of March 1818 and that I have not nor has
any person in trust for me any property or accounts
contracts or debts due to me nor have any income
other than what is contained in the schedule hereto
annexed and by and subscribed Court (one hand)
that he has no family and that his trade is that

APPLICATION FOR A TRANSFER.

On this *Twenty fourth* day of *August*. 1829;

before me, the subscriber, a Justice of the Peace for the said county of *Green* personally appeared ~~*James Bruce*~~ *George Bruce* who, on his oath, declares that he is the same person who formerly belonged to the company commanded by Captain *Robert Bell* in the Regiment commanded by Colonel *John Gibson* in the service of the United States; that his name was placed on the pension roll of the State of *Kentucky* from whence he has lately removed; that he now resides in the State, (District, or Territory,) of *Ohio* where he intends to remain, and wishes his pension to be there payable, in future. The following are his reasons for removing from *Kentucky* to *Ohio*.

That because he had lost all that part of his family that resides with him in Kentucky, and he had two sons living in the State of Ohio, one of whom he now resides with, and expects to be taken care of by him.

The county Clerk, Secretary of State, or some other officer, must certify, under his seal of office, that the officer who administered the oath is a Justice of the Peace, Judge, Mayor, Alderman, or Notary Public, as the case may be, and that the signature purporting to be his is genuine.

☐ The oath must be supported by the testimony of some respectable person, as to the Pensioner's identity. He must swear, that the person who has taken the above oath is the person described in the affidavit. The Magistrate must certify, that the witness is a person of veracity; and the affidavit must also be authenticated in the manner above directed.

Dear Sir:

Reference is made to your letter in which you request the records of William Bruce and of several soldiers with the name George Bruce, all of whom served in the Virginia Troops.

Revolutionary War data furnished by this office are obtained from claims made to the United States for pension and bounty land based upon military service of soldiers of that war.

A careful search of the Revolutionary War records has been made in your behalf and the record of only one George Bruce and of only one William Bruce, who served in the Virginia Troops, have been found. Their records are given below as found in their respective claims for pension, S. 35791 and S. 2033, based upon their military service in that war.

George Bruce
S. 35791

The date and place of birth and the names of the parents of George Bruce are not shown in the papers in the pension claim.

He enlisted in the state of Virginia, in September, 1776, served in Colonel Crawford's Virginia Regiment and in Captain Robert Beall's Company, Colonel John Gibson's Virginia Regiment, was in the battle of Brandywine and was discharged in the winter of 1778.

He was allowed pension on his application executed September 12,

Sol. stated that he served under Capt Robt Beall; first in Crawford's Regt & then in John Gibson's Regt but as Beall does not appear to have served under Crawford's company it is as above

1820, at which time he was aged sixty years and resided in Holston County, Kentucky.

In 1820, George Bruce had traveled to Green County, Ohio, to reside with his son; he stated that he had lost all of his family who formerly lived with him in Kentucky; no names of wife or children are shown and there are no further data as to family.

William Bruce was born in 1763 in Culpeper County, Virginia.

While residing in Culpeper County, Virginia, he enlisted sometime in 1779 and served three months in Captain Robert Allcock's Virginia Company; he enlisted again in 1781, and served three months in Captain Joseph Woods' Company, Colonel Robert Allcock's Virginia Regiment.

After the Revolution, he moved to Wilkes County, North Carolina, and in 1795 to Sumner County, Tennessee, of which county he was a resident when he was allowed pension on his application executed August 23, 1832.

There are no data as to soldier's family.
