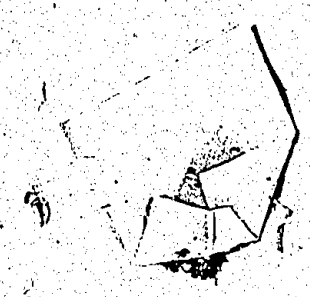

Probate District of New Milford ss:

On this 16<sup>th</sup> day of October 1834 personally appeared in open Court before the Court of Probate for said District now sitting at New Milford in said District & County Athanas Canfield a resident of said New Milford aged Seventy years the 19<sup>th</sup> day of February last past who being first duly sworn according to law, doth, on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provisions of the Act of Congress passed June 7<sup>th</sup> 1832

That he entered the service of the United States under the following named Officers and served as herein stated

That about the 1<sup>st</sup> of October 1779 Nath Canfield of sd. New Milford was drafted for the term of six weeks and the sd. Nath Canfield hired him (the declarant) as his substitute. and he (the declarant) entered the service of the United States as a private as substitute for the said Nath Canfield some time (as he verily believes) between the 10<sup>th</sup> and the 15<sup>th</sup> of October 1779 at said New Milford and went to New Town and was there inspected, from

Newtown he marched to Stratford where  
he arrived about the 15<sup>th</sup> of the same month  
at which place he & the Company to which  
he belonged were stationed. He remained  
at Stratford till the expiration of the draft  
(six weeks) when the Officers requested those who  
were willing to remain in the service to stay  
six weeks longer and he with a number  
of others agreed to stay in the service that  
length of time longer and he (the declarant)  
accordingly remained at Stratford a period  
in the service of the United States till the middle  
of January 1780 making a tour of three  
months in the whole. The Company to which  
he (the declarant) belonged was commanded  
by Capt. Noble Price. The Regt. to which he  
belonged was commanded by Col. Samuel  
Carfield. Isaac Benson was an Officer in  
the Regiment & he believes an adjutant but is  
not positive what office he did hold. He was hon-  
orably discharged but had no written discharge. As  
proof of this service he refers the Department to  
the Affidavit of Nathan Benson due to be sworn.

He also declares that the latter part of June or  
first of July 1780 he was drafted as a private  
for the term of three months at Dedhampton  
and marched to Danbury and was there instead  
at which place he remained two or three  
weeks and from Danbury he marched to

Norwalk & Stamford & from thence to Horse-  
meek at which place he was stationed and  
remained there in the service of the United States  
the principal part of the time for which he was  
drafted about 7 or 8 years. He & the <sup>Regiment</sup> ~~Company~~ there  
marched to King Street in the State of New York a  
little north of White Plains at which place he  
remained till he was honorably dismissed or  
discharged about the first of October of the  
same year (1780) he is not mistaken as to the  
time of his discharge it being about ten days  
after the capture of Major Andre and the  
escape of Arnold - He had no written discharge  
Capt. Ebenezer Covert commanded the Compa-  
ny to which he belonged Daniel Covert was  
Lieutenant - He believes a man by the name  
of Thomas was Ensign - Col. Samuel Conifer  
commanded the Regiment - Doct. Fuller was  
surgeon of the Regiment - Joseph Baldwin  
was an officer in the Regiment & he believes  
was adjutant - Spooner was a sergeant  
in the Company - As proof of this service  
he refers the Department to the affidavits  
of John Hatch and Abijah Treat hereto  
annexed

He further declares that in the summer of 1781 he was again drafted as a private for three months and marched the first of July of the same year to the Round Mills in Dutch Kill State of New York where he remained ten or twelve days; he then returned home ~~at~~ <sup>to</sup> Milford with Lieutenant Hubbard after more men who were drafted & had not gone on while he was at home the Regt. moved to Westpoint and on his return which was not far from the middle <sup>or 20<sup>th</sup></sup> of July he joined the Regt. at Westpoint. He then remained at Westpoint in the service of the United State till the time for which he was drafted (thirteen) had expired which was about the first of October 1781. It was then requested by Genl. M<sup>o</sup> Douglas who was the Chief Commander that, as many of the soldiers as were willing to stay should remain till after the surrender of Cornwallis which was then daily expected & he together with a great many others accordingly remained till after that event took place and they kept a day of rejoicing in consequence of it; after which, and as he

truly believes about the first of November  
of the same year he was honorably dis-  
charged or dismissed, he had no written  
discharge - making a tour in the whole  
at this time of ~~four~~ months - Captain  
Abram Cook commanded the Com-  
pany to which he (the declarant) belonged  
Amos Horibell was Lieutenant - Seaborn  
Cary was Ensign - Nathan Bronson  
& Elijah Hoyt were Sergeants in said  
Company - Col. Samuel Confield com-  
manded the Regt. to which he (the declarant)  
was attached - Doct. George A. Reed was  
Surgeon of the Regt.

He refers the Department to the affidavits  
of Nathan Bronson & Elijah Hoyt he has  
obtained for proof of this time of his  
service - He has never stated in  
the whole a service of ten months  
as a private for which service he claims  
a pension - He has no documentary  
evidence of his services

He was born at said New Milford on  
the 19<sup>th</sup> day of February 1764 at which  
place he has ever since resided and now  
resides there - He hereby relinquishes

very claim whether to a pension  
or annuity except the present, and declares  
that his name is not on the pension roll  
of the Agency of any State

records of the Town of Stratford

On this 19<sup>th</sup> day of July 1877, personally appeared before the Court of Jurisdicts for said District Betsy Campfield a resident of said New Milford in said District aged seventy nine years who being first duly sworn according to law doth in her oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the pension made by the act of Congress passed July 7<sup>th</sup> 1838 - entitled an act granting relief and pensions to certain widows and the acts supplementary thereto - that she is the widow of Tharmar Campfield late of said New Milford deceased who was a private (or officer she cannot tell which) in the Army of the Revolution he was a prisoner under the act of the 7<sup>th</sup> of June 1832 and his pension certificate was issued 3<sup>d</sup> of December 1835 - which certificate has lately been returned to the Department at Washington and for the particulars of her husband's service she respectfully refers the Officers of the Department to her declaration and the proof accompanying the same now on file in the Pension Office - and to said certificate and the accompanying documents. She further declares that she was married to the said Tharmar Campfield on the twenty fifth day of September in the year one thousand seven

hundred and eighty seven and that her husband  
the aforesaid. Ittamar Campfield died on the eleventh  
day of April. 1848, and for proof of this fact  
she refers the officers of the Department to the  
evidence lately furnished with a view of obtaining  
the arrears of pension due her said husband  
at the time of his decease which evidence is  
now on file in the Office of the Department  
(as she supposes) and further that she was  
not married to him the said Ittamar Campfield  
prior to his leaving the service but the marriage  
took place prior to the first of January Eighteen  
hundred — viz at the time previously stated  
herein —

I Royal I. Campfield of New Milford Litchfield County, a State of Connecticut aged forty five years being first duly sworn according to law do declare and say that I am the son of Ittamar Campfield deceased, and of Betsy <sup>the mother of said Ittamar</sup> Campfield, who is still living that my said father died in the 11<sup>th</sup> day of April 1848. and that my said mother Betsy Campfield is now living in New Milford and is the same identical person who has this day made an application for a partition and is according to my best knowledge and belief the identical person described in the following transcript of the record taken from my said father's family Bible on the 19<sup>th</sup> day of July 1849 - which copy of said record is as follows (to wit)

" Ittamar Campfield was born Feb<sup>r</sup> 19<sup>th</sup> 1763  
Betsy Starr was born January 2<sup>d</sup> 1770  
They were joined in marriage Sept 20<sup>th</sup> 1783"

and

I the said Royal I. Campfield do declare and say that the above extract is a true and literal copy of the record in my said father (Ittamar Campfield) family Bible and further state that said Bible upon which said record is found has always been in my said father's family until his decease

and that the same is now in the possession  
of my said Mother Betsey Campfield and is  
kept at my dwelling house in New Milford.  
and I also further state that both my said father  
and Mother have told me frequently that the  
record from which the foregoing extract is  
made, was their family record and further  
dependent with out - Royal J. Campfield
