Preble County S.D.

on the ¹ day of September
in the year of our Lord one thousand and eight
hundred and thirty two personally appears
in Open Court before the Honorable the Judge
of the Court of Common Pleas for the said
County of Preble in the State of Ohio No. 1
sitting - William DeCoursey ^{the} resident
of Dickson Township in the County of Preble
and State of Ohio aged Seventy six years
who being first duly sworn according to law
doth on his oath make the following declara-
tion in order to obtain the benefit of the act
of Congress passed June 7th 1832

That he entered the service of the United States
as a Volunteer Militia man under Captain
Sam'l Reed and Lieut. John Grimes in the North
Carolina Militia at the County of Rowan
State of N. Carolina of ¹⁸ where he then resided
The time he entered the service he cannot re-
collect but is certain and positive that he
served six weeks under the aforesaid officers
in what was then called the Scotch Camp-
aign that they marched to the Scott's Telle
mount in the lower part of N. Carolina and
on their return was discharged from service

that shortly afterwards he entered the service of the United States as a Volunteer
Militia man under the aforesaid Capt. Reed
and Lieut Grimes in the N. Carolina Mi-
litia at the County of Rowan State of N.
Carolina, that they were attached to Colonel
Locks Regiment N. Carolina militia
under the command of Genl. Rutherford
that they marched to the head of the Catawba
River in pursuit of the Indians & Tories and
on their return was discharged out of service
after serving four weeks

that sometime in the month of ~~October~~
October A.D. 1779 he enter the service of
the United States at the aforesaid County
of Rowan State of N. Carolina as a Volun-
teer Militia man in the N. Carolina
Militia in a company of Militia
Commanded by Captain Nicholas Jones
Lieut Chapman in Col^o. Locks Regt.
of N. Carolina Militia under the com-
mand of Genl. Rutherford this was a
General Call on the Militia - we marched
to Charleston S.C. and from there to a place
called the Black Swamp not far from Savan-
na where we were attached to the Regular Army

than commanded by Genl. Lincoln we wintered
at a place called the two Sisters & the
Black Swamp changing our position as
circumstances seemed to require during
the winter our troops had some skirmishing
with the British who then had possession
of the town of Savanna and the country
on that side of the Savanna River. on
one occasion a detachment of our troops
under the command of Genl. A.S. crossed
over the Savanna River at a place called
the mouth of Briar Creek had an engagement
with the British and was defeated
he was discharged some time in the month
of April A.D. 1780 after remaining
during which time he found spurious his own discharge
and again took up his duty for further service
six months in the service & he further avers
and declares that he did serve the three
several terms of duty as aforesaid during
the Revolutionary War making agree-
ably eight months of himself
that he has no documentary evidence of his
last services and that he knows of no per-
son whose testimony he can procure who
can testify to his services - that he has no

(written discharge) nor does not know
that he ever had - he hereby relinquishes
any claim to a pension or annuity except
the present and declares that his name
is not on the Pension Roll of the agen-
cy of any State - he further says that
he has no record of his age but has
always been told and believes that he was
Born in the County of Baltimore and
State of Maryland on the 24th day of
May A.D. 1756. that he lived in Rowan
County in the state of N. Carolina when call-
ed into service and served in the militia
of that state and in the Revolutionary
War he lived in Campbell County in the
state of Kentucky and from that place he
came to Preble County in the state of Ohio
where he now lives and has lived for 16
years last past - and that he is known to
and acquainted with James Gordon Esq. and
Moses Gooley Senr. in his present neighborhood
who can testify as to his character for verac-
ity and their belief of his services as a sol-
dier of the Revolution -

Declaration

In order to obtain the benefit of the third
Section of the act of Congress of the 4th July 1836
State of Kentucky ss.

Campbell County ss.

On this seventh day of July 1842 personally
appeared before the Judge of the Campbell
Circuit Court Elizabeth De Courcy a resident
of Coldspring in the County and State aforesaid
said aged eighty two years six Months and
eleven days who being first duly sworn
according to law doth on her oath make the
following declaration in order to obtain the
benefit of the provision made by the act of
congress passed July 4th 1836. That she is the
widow of William De Courcy who was a
private in the army of the Revolution and
at the time he entered the service he lived in
the County of Rowan in the state of South
Carolina that about three days after our mar-
riage he volunteered into the service of the
United States and marched into South Caroli-
na where he continued three months after
which he volunteered at various times to go
against the British Tories and Indians
But she cannot precisely recollect the dates
or length of service it being more than fifty
years since. She further declares that she
was married to the said William De Courcy
on Monday the fourteenth day of July 1776
and that her husband the aforesaid William
De Courcy died on the twenty third day of Octo-
ber 1841 and that she has remained a widow
ever since that period. She further declares
that her late husband William De Courcy

was placed on the pension list on the fifth day
of March 1833 at which time he lived in Prooble County
State of Ohio and about ~~lived~~ in Cincinnati
but had resided in Campbell County State of Kentucky
four or five years previous to his death and that she
has no documentary evidence in support of the
claim except the pension certificate of her late
husband which she has surrendered some weeks
since to the war department which was dated
the fifth of March 1833 as above. Also certifies said
De Courcy was entitled to receive twenty eight dollars
thirty three cents per annum during his natural
life as will more fully appear by reference to
the proof hereto annexed & sworn to and subscribed
in open Court on the day and year above written
before - being the seventh of July 1842.

On this 26th day of August 1842 personally appeared Wm De Courcy before me Charles Munnam a justice of the peace in and for said County of lawful age who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath say that the bible now in his possession and this day exhibited before me from which the attached record was in my presence taken and attached to this paper by wafer, was the family bible of William De Courcy deceased who was a pensioner of the United States at the time of his death. That the Elisabetha Pruin mentioned in the said record is the identical person now applying for a pension as the wife of an widower of said Wm De Courcy deceased. That the attached record is in the hand writing of John De Courcy of the Rising sun Dearborn County state of Indiana. Except the record of the marriage of John De Courcy and Mary De Courcy which is in the hand writing of said John De Courcy and also except the record of the death of my father Wm De Courcy which is in my own hand writing and that the whole is true and genuine as he verily believes swears to and subscribed this day and year above written.
